These Were the 5 Best Things at Art Basel Miami Beach 2016

"Dreyfus has the skill to take a private space to combine art and design in a way that introduces younger artists and makers," says Diaz, who especially liked the works by Miami artists Cristina Lei Rodriguez and Jillian Mayer, noting that "Rodriguez blurs the boundaries of art and design, which brings up the question: What are the rules for art and design to coexist in the same space?"
