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What's happening in Tampa Bay art: 'The Fabric of India,' Florida Museum of Photographic Arts exhibit

HISTORICALLY BEAUTIFUL: The Fabric of India

The "Fabric of
India" exhibit at the
Ringling Museum is open.
Taken from the collection
of London's Victoria and
Albert Museum, along with
private collections, the
exhibit showcases Indian
textiles dating as far back
as the 15th century
through the present. As
one would imagine, the
examples are colorful and
ornate and include
apparel. But this exhibit

also explores how the textiles intersect with religion, politics and global trade throughout the centuries, so it's fascinating and educational to boot. Looking ahead, the museum has programming that complements the exhibition. In the Global Desi Bass Experience on Sept. 19, New York City DJ Rehka blends Indian bhangra music with hiphop and international beats. On Oct. 11 and 12, the Indian classical dance ensemble Nrityagram will perform *Dasavatar*. The exhibition remains on display through Oct. 13.

PANEL DISCUSSION: Contemporary Performance

Tampa Bay has an art star in **Kalup Linzy**. The artist who got his MFA at the University of South Florida has gone on to become noticed by a *New York Times* art critic, leading to his work being shown at MOMA, the Met and the Whitney. Linzy's performance-based work challenges gender roles and embraces pop cultural forms including drag performances and soap operas, like his senior thesis video performance, *All My Churen*. Actor James Franco saw him perform at Art Basel in Miami in 2009, which led to an ongoing collaboration. Linzy has returned to his roots to curate an exhibition at the Florida Museum of Photographic Arts, "**Contemporary Performance**." He and a panel of artists from the exhibition will discuss gender, sexuality, class, race and social identities.
